Dear Administrator and Educators:

It is hard to believe that the new school year is nearly upon us! Soon, you will be making choices for classroom enrichment experiences – whether those are field trips, or perhaps hosting programs there at your school.

**Enclosed with this letter, you will find a copy of the education guide for the Quayle Vice Presidential Learning Center, which provides quality programming for your classroom needs. If you would, please share this guide with your staff. If you would like a version which can be distributed electronically, an online downloadable pdf copy can be found on our website, [www.quaylemuseum.org](http://www.quaylemuseum.org), or I can email a copy directly to you.**

Let me quickly outline a few of the changes for this upcoming school year:

1. Field Trips to the Center - \$2.50 per student per program. All accompanying adults are free.
2. Outreach programs - \$3.00 per student per program, plus mileage. Additional fees may apply to overnight outreach programming. For groups with 200 to 500 students, there is a discounted pricing option. It is a \$450.00 flat fee for the first 100 students, plus \$1.25 per each additional student and mileage, etc. For groups over 500 students, please call for pricing.

I have added a bit more information to our program, The Constitution Rules. This program is most appropriate for 3<sup>rd</sup> through 5<sup>th</sup> grade. If you have not yet lined up your programming for Constitution Day in September, may I suggest this program. For groups over 200 students, there is a special discounted pricing option. It is a \$325.00 flat fee for the first 100 students, plus \$0.75 per each additional student. If this is outreach, mileage may apply.

I would also like to mention that our gift shop now features an area where all souvenirs are under \$2.00, with most being less than \$1.00. Please keep this in mind for your next trip! I would also remind you that dates, especially fall, will fill up quickly. I already have schools on the schedule into 2010. Outreach to Long Island, NY schools is already set for the week of October 5<sup>th</sup>. If you have not already scheduled your annual visit/outreach, I would do so before the dates disappear. # Booking Your Visit

To reserve your program time, please call the Museum at (260) 356-6356. We also have a **booking calendar online** at our website, [www.quaylemuseum.org](http://www.quaylemuseum.org), from which you can check available dates or book your tour. We ask that reservations be made at least one week in advance to receive a guided program. We encourage one adult for every 10 students if possible.

A helpful tip is to book early for your program. Time slots will go quickly, especially for fall.

# Affordable Quality

Your field trip is \$2.50 per student per program during your visit to the Museum.

Special pricing is available for "The Constitution Rules" program for groups over 200. See back for Outreach Programming pricing. We recommend one program per visit, but can accommodate two consecutive programs.

# Exhibit Galleries

There are two permanent exhibit galleries. *The Gallery of the Vice Presidents* features artifacts relating to every vice president in history. The oldest piece dates back to 1789 with John Adams as the first vice president. **This gallery has been completely reworked in 2009.** *The Quayle Vice Presidential Gallery* outlines the life of the 44th vice president from childhood through the years of his vice presidency.

If you are able to visit, the Center has a gift shop of affordably priced

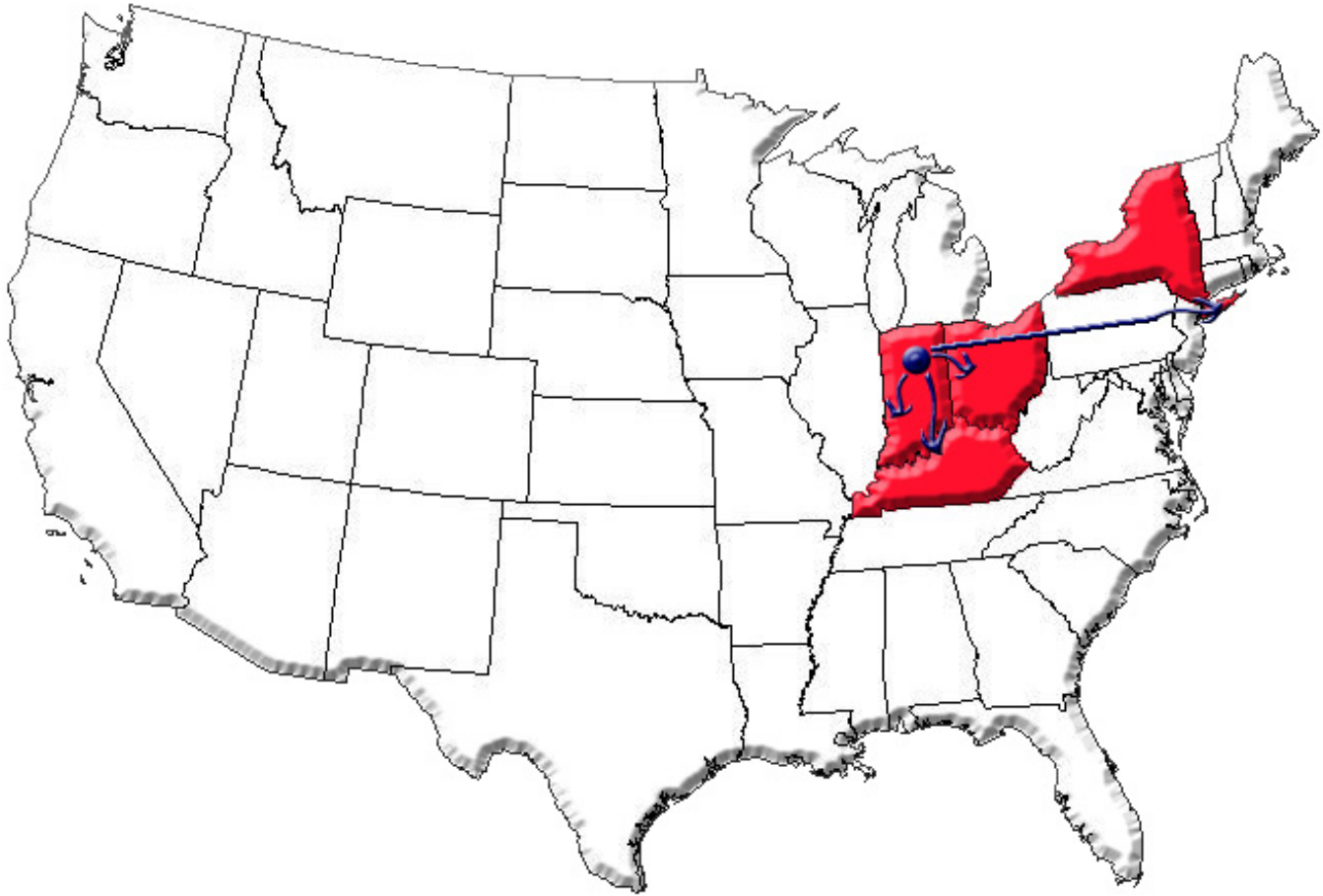

## Bringing The Museum To Your Classroom



### Budget Tight? Think You're Too Far Away? We'll Come To Your School!

Gas prices are running very high. School budgets have been tightened further and further. If you are not able to bring your class to us, let us bring the Vice Presidents to your class. All of our programs are available to be presented at your school. Depending on the program, appropriate visual materials and artifacts will be brought to give your students the best possible experience.

Worried that you may be too far away, even to bring our programs to your school? Ask us! You'd be surprised how flexible we are! The Museum's programs have been presented in schools throughout Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and even New York. If your students are willing to learn, we're willing to come to you!

**Outreach Fees:** The cost for outreach is **\$3.00 per student per program**, with a minimum fee of \$100, plus mileage. Additional fees required if an overnight stay is necessary. For groups with 200 to 500 students, there is a discounted pricing option. It is \$450.00 flat fee for the first 100 students, plus \$1.25 per each additional student. Mileage, plus overnight fees (if necessary) also apply. For groups over 500 students, please call for pricing.

An excellent way to save even further is to combine outreach visits among multiple schools. We have served many schools this way.
